May 17 - Romans 14:8 - Sad day in the Kingdom

Hello and thanks for joining in on to today's daily devotion. Today is Tuesday. May 17th. The 3rd day of the Hebraic week.

Our verse today is 2 Corinthians 2:17.

2 Cor 2:17 Unlike so many, we do not peddle the word of God for profit. On the contrary, in Christ we speak before God with sincerity, like men sent from God.

Yet, this topic hit a little closer to home for me the other day. I had an individual share with me how a minister is taking my Daily Devotions and using the content in them for messages and FaceBook posts as if it all originated from him. While I was flattered that this guy was using my material, I was suddenly saddened. Saddened that ministers..... *Ministers*.... can't get one on one with the YHWH to hear what the Father is speaking to *them* to share. Instead, they present what others have heard form YHWH as if it was their direct revelation. All the while they know they received it from someone else.

It's a sad day in the Kingdom when YHWH's *leaders* can't hear His voice for themselves.

Whether you are a leader or not, make it a point that you focus on hearing YHWH's voice for yourself.
